The Importance of Imaginary Play

PLAYDOH

Imaginary play encourages social development in young children. In this type of play, children are being themselves whilst simultaneously being someone else. This gives them a chance to explore the world from different perspectives, and is an achievement that requires thinking about two ways of being at once, something that children may have difficulty doing in other circumstances. In addition, children are learning to understand the basic principles of society and how it functions, and the important rules and routines of everyday life. We should actively encourage our children when they engage in imaginary play and provide plenty of props and play opportunities with both similar aged peers and also with adults.
